## **Public Participation:**

It is the policy of the Approval Authority to encourage and permit public participation and comment on matters within the Approval Authority's jurisdiction, as follows.

- Public Comment on Agenda Items. The Approval Authority will take public comment on each item on the agenda. The Approval Authority will take public comment on an action item before the Approval Authority takes any action on that item. Persons addressing the Approval Authority on an agenda item shall confine their remarks to that particular agenda item. For each agenda item, each member of the public may address the Approval Authority once, for up to three minutes. The Chair may limit the public comment on an agenda item to less than three minutes per speaker, based on the nature of the agenda item, the number of anticipated speakers for that item, and the number and anticipated duration of other agenda items.
- General Public Comment. The Approval Authority shall include general public comment as an agenda item at each meeting of the Approval Authority. During general public comment, each member of the public may address the Approval Authority on matters within the Approval Authority's jurisdiction. Issues discussed during general public comment must not appear elsewhere on the agenda for that meeting. Each member of the public may address the Approval Authority once during general public comment, for up to three minutes. The Chair may limit the total general public comment to 30 minutes and may limit the time allocated to each speaker depending on the number of speakers during general public comment and the number and anticipated duration of agenda items.
- *Speaker Identification*. Individuals making public comment may be requested, but not required, to identify themselves and whom they represent.
- Designated Public Comment Area. Members of the public wishing to address the Approval Authority must speak from the public comment area.
- Comment, Not Debate. During public comment, speakers shall address their remarks to the Approval Authority as a whole and not to individual Approval Authority representatives, the General Manager or Management Team members, or the audience. Approval Authority Representatives and other persons are not required to respond to questions from a speaker. Approval Authority Representatives shall not enter into debate or discussion with speakers during public comment, although Approval Authority Representatives may question speakers to obtain clarification. Approval Authority Representatives may ask the General Manager to investigate an issue raised during public comment and later report to the Approval Authority. The lack of a response by the Approval Authority to public comment does not necessarily constitute agreement with or support of comments made during public comment.
- Speaker Conduct. The Approval Authority will not tolerate disruptive conduct by individuals making public comment. Speakers who use profanity or engage in yelling,

screaming, or other disruptive behavior will be directed to cease that conduct and may be asked to leave the meeting room.

## REGULAR MEETING MINUTES DRAFT

## 1. Roll Call

UASI Vice-Chair Rich Lucia called the meeting to order at 10:03 AM and General Manager Craig Dziedzic subsequently took the roll. Vice-Chair Lucia was present. Chair Mary Ellen Carroll was absent, but her alternate Adrienne Bechelli was present. Members Michael Cochrane, Toshia Shavies Marshall, Gerry Malais, and Christopher Godley were present. Members Raymond Riordan, Dana Reed, Mike Casten, Bob Doyle, and Mark Robbins were absent, but their alternates Judi Torrico, David Flamm, Chris Simmons, Rick Navarro, and Scott Kirkpatrick were present.

## 2. Approval of the Minutes

Vice Chair Lucia asked for any comments or questions concerning the minutes from the August 8, 2019 meeting. Seeing none, he requested a motion to approve the minutes.

### 3. General Manager's Report

### (a) Notification of Subrecipient FY 19 Award

General Manager Craig Dziedzic notified the Approval Authority members of Cal OES' approval of the Bay Area UASI's FY 2019 Homeland Security Grant application. The Management Team received the California Supplement to the Federal Notice of Funding Opportunity for the FY 2019 Homeland Security Grant Program and all FY 2019 MOUs have been sent to grant subrecipients.

### (b) UASI FY 2020 Project Proposal Process

General Manager Craig Dziedzic briefed the board on the FY 20 project proposal process. Online submissions began in September and closed in October. A total of 189 applications, amounting to \$37,288,989, were received. This amount exceeds the amount of anticipated funding.

Approval Authority Members have been given the opportunity to review their jurisdiction's proposals from November 14 to December 1, 2019. This allows them time to ensure consistency with their own operational area and/or core city priorities.

On October 30, 2019, BAUASI Regional Grants Manager Mary Landers sent an email to Approval Authority Members requesting confirmation of their respective Hub Voting members by November 13, 2019.

#### (c) Other Grant Updates

General Manager Craig Dziedzic provided the Approval Authority updates on other grants:

Regional Catastrophic Preparedness Grant Program (RCPGP)

In September 2019, the Bay Area UASI was notified by the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) that the RCPGP application was accepted and approved for \$1,406,550. The grant has a three year performance period and allows 5% for management and administration (M&A). The Management team will be increasing its staff to accommodate a project manager and an analyst to oversee the Commodity Points of Distribution (C-POD) project.

Securing the Cities (STC) Grant

The Bay Area UASI was one of six urban areas selected by the Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction (CWMD) Office to apply for the STC grant, which is a cooperative grant having a ten year performance period, 5% M&A, and a 48 county area of responsibility. The total amount available to the six agencies the first year is \$12 million. The Bay Area UASI has requested \$7.3 million. The purpose of the grant is to increase the region's preventive, radiological, nuclear, detection (PRND) capabilities.

A member of the board made a comment.

(d) Approval of the 2020 Calendar for Approval Authority Meetings

General Manager Craig Dziedzic proposed the 2020 Schedule of Approval Authority Meetings to the Board.

## 4. FY 20 HUB Funding Allocation Formula

Project Manager Amy Ramirez proposed the Hub Funding Formula for the FY 20 grant cycle. The Bay Area UASI uses DHS' Metropolitan Statistical Area risk formula to guide the administration of grant dollars among the four hubs. The FY 2020 allocation percentages will be as follows: East Hub = 23.54%; North Hub = 6.65%; South Hub = 25.08%; West Hub = 44.73%. The FY 2020 hub allocation risk percentages are unchanged from FY 2019.

**Motion:** Approve the proposed FY 2020 UASI HUB funding formula.

## 5. 2019 THIRA/SPR Update

Regional Project Manager Amy Ramirez provided a background briefing on the updated THIRA/SPR and requested approval from the Approval Authority.

**Motion:** Approve the 2019 THIRA/SPR for submission to FEMA.

**Vote:** The motion was passed unanimously.

Two members of the board made comments.

## 6. Regional Training and Exercise RFP Update

Regional Program Manager Janell Myhre provided an update on the Regional Training and Exercise (T&E) RFP process. Based on their analysis of the applicants, the Management Team and a Technical Review panel recommended the selection of Sensemakers, Inc. Upon a further fiscal review, it was determined that additional regional savings could be achieved by funding Sensemakers to perform all programmatic activities (e.g. training course admin, exercise design/conduct and community preparedness) and by adding 2 members to the Management Team to provide administrative support (e.g. T &E Work group management, developing multi-year T &E plan, and program management). This "blended approach" is expected to save the region approximately \$750,000 from the originally funded \$4.7 million Training and Exercise program. The Management team further recommends the equal distribution of these funds to the four (4) Hubs for a total of \$187,500 to each Hub.

Motion: Accept a blended staffing approach to administer the Regional Training and

Exercise Program and accept the equal distribution of \$750,000 to the four (4)

Hubs.

Moved: Member Cochrane Seconded: Member Simmons

**Vote:** The motion was passed unanimously.

## 7. Radiological Security Initiative Update

Ed Baldini from the Office of Radiological Security (ORS) provided an update on ORS 2020 Cities Initiative activities in the Bay Area. Mr. Baldini reviewed current capabilities and commended the Bay Area for increasing the security of radiological sources in the Bay Area. He also discussed the next steps in continuing and sustaining important radiological security efforts.

A member of the board made a comment.

## 8. CBRNE Program Update

Regional Project Manager Phil White provided an update on the Chemical Biological Radiological Nuclear Explosive (CBRNE) program. He stated that the region's Preventive Radiological/Nuclear Detection (PRND) Concept of Operations Plan aligns with the National PRND Concept of Operations Plan. He also discussed that the Bay Area UASI has applied for the Securing the Cities grant. This anticipated grant award will enhance Bay Area CBRNE and PRND capabilities, increase equipment ownership and provide additional training and exercise funding to the region.

Two members of the board made comments.

## 9. BAYRICS JPA Quarterly Report

BayRICS General Manager Corey Reynolds presented the BayRICS JPA Quarterly Report. He discussed the quarterly report and its strategic initiatives, and progress. Mr. Reynolds also presented the future goals of the BayRICS Authority.

Three members of the board made comments.

## 10. Reallocation of Grant Funds and FY 19 Cybersecurity Assessment

Chief Financial Officer Tristan Levardo presented a report on the reallocation of FY 18 grant funds and the FY 19 Cybersecurity Assessment requirement. He stated that, in accordance with Approval Authority Bylaws Section 8.5, the Management Team is to report project budget changes under \$250,000 on a bi-annual basis.

He also stated that the FY 2019 subrecipients are required to complete the Nationwide Cybersecurity Review (NCSR). Failure to complete the NCSR in a timely manner will be deemed as noncompliant and may result in a suspension and/or termination of funding for the subrecipient.

One member of the board made a comment.

## **Discussion/Description:**

(a) FY20 UASI Grant Update (Discussion)

The fiscal year (FY) 2020 Consolidated Appropriations bills were signed into law on December 20, 2019, and provides discretionary funding for all federal agencies including the Departments of Justice and Homeland Security. The bill funds these departments through the end of the fiscal year, September 30, 2020.

Funding for grant programs will increase slightly by providing \$665 million for the Urban Area Security Initiative. See Chart below:

## (b) RCPGP and STC Grants Updates

On December 17, 2019 the Management Team met with FEMA Region IX grants division and was handed the official award for the Regional Catastrophic Preparedness Grant in the amount of \$1.4 million. The

Management Team is preparing the Accept and Expend legislation for approval by the San Francisco Board of Supervisors.

On December 4, 2019, the Management Team had a telephone conference with representatives from the Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction (CWMD) Office regarding our application for the Securing the Cities (STC) grant. The UASI Management Team had initially requested approximately \$7.3 million in the application but now were advised that the STC grant award would only be \$2 million and a revision of the budget and budget narrative reflecting this change was required. The Management Team submitted the revised documents and we are waiting for the official award letter.

## (c) 2020 National Homeland Security Conference (Discussion)

For the upcoming 2020 National Homeland Security Conference, which will be held in Chicago, IL (June 29 – July 3), the Management Team submitted three panel presentations highlighting regional, collaborative, and whole community preparedness initiatives of the Bay Area UASI.

These presentations include the following:

- 1. Bridging the Gap Between Cybersecurity and Emergency Response
- 2. How to Effectively Sustain Grant Funded Programs
- 3. Leveraging Federal Partnerships in Building and Sustaining a Regional PRND Program

## **Background**

The FY20 UASI Project Proposal Guidance states that the Bay Area UASI Management Team will report all regional proposal submissions to the Approval Authority, along with funding recommendations based on the region's risk and gaps as well as funding availability.

Listed in Table One below are regional sustainment projects and regional projects vetted at a UASI workgroup meeting prior to the October 11, 2019 proposal submission deadline. There are three (3) sustainment projects: training and exercise, fusion center, and public safety information sharing. These projects will be presented directly to the Approval Authority in today's meeting. Regional projects are described in the PowerPoint.

### Analysis

The Sustainment Projects will be presented as Annual Reports.

Regional projects will be presented in the PowerPoint and all project leads are available to answer questions from the Approval Authority.

Please note that the Management Team's current funding recommendations for the regional projects assumes that our FY20 grant will be the same as last year, with the State retaining the same percentage of the grant as last year (i.e. 17.5%).

The Management Team will provide final funding recommendations once DHS announces the FY20 grant award amount, likely at either the May or July Approval Authority meeting. At that time, the Approval Authority will also review/approve all hub projects recommended by hub voting members.

010920 Approval Authority Meeting Agenda Item 05: UASI FY20 Sustainment and Proposed Regional Projects

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In FY 19, the sustainment projects were funded in the amount of \$10,249,263 and the other proposed regional projects were funded in the amount of \$971,276. The total for all regional funding for FY 19 totaled \$11,220,539.

The total amount requested in FY 20, including the sustainment projects is \$14,176,742. One proposed regional project was ineligible (\$19,000), so the total eligible requested amount for all regional projects is \$14,157,742.

The Management Team recommends funding the FY 20 sustainment projects at \$9,862,812 and the other regional projects in the amount of \$598,000. The total amount recommended for all sustainment and regional project funding is \$10,460,812.

## **Discussion/Description:**

The Bay Area UASI has funded the Regional Training and Exercise Program since July 2011. The regional training and exercise program was developed and managed by the Alameda County Sheriff's Office until March 2019 when Alameda County discontinued their management.

This presentation (Appendix A1) reviews the key achievements of the 2019 Regional Training and Exercise Program, along with a proposed budget. The proposed FY20 budget will be included in the presentation of the overall planned approach from the new administrator of the RTEP, SenseMakers, LLC.

A summary of key achievements by the Regional Training and Exercise Program are as follows:

January – June 2019

- Maintained the Regional Training and Exercise team.
- Maintained the Regional Training and Exercise website.
- Continued identifying consortium courses (free training) through the National Domestic Preparedness Consortium (NDPC).

As approved at the March 2019 meeting, each hub received an equal distribution of \$3,251,340 in regional Training and Exercise funds to conduct classes locally. Those expenditures began in June 2019 and all classes are scheduled to be completed by June 2020.

A \$400,000 increase in funding to supplement Regional Coordination Exercises was also approved at the March 2019. In addition to the Critical Transportation planned activities, exercises to build Paratransit and Critical Transportation capabilities was also conducted. All exercises have been completed and vetted planning and response tools and templates have been provided to stakeholders. The region will use these

tools and After Action information to continue building critical transportation, public information and warning, and access and functional needs capabilities in the 2020 exercise.


## **Next Steps:**

As the new Regional Training and Exercise Program Administrator, SenseMakers, Inc., will be working with the UASI Management team to administer the FY20 Regional Training and Exercise Program. Duties shared by SenseMakers and the UASI Management Team includes:

- 1. Regional Training and Exercise Work Group management
- 2. Multi-Year Training and Exercise Plan (MYTEP) development
- 3. Regional Training course selection and implementation
- 4. Regional Exercise design and conduct
- 5. Community Preparedness initiative
- 6. Program Management

The first Regional Training and Exercise Work Group meeting is planned for February 2020. Multi-Year Training and Exercise Program (MYTEP) meetings will begin in March to develop guidance for the next three years of activities. Scheduling for training courses and access to the new training and exercise registration website is expected by May. Regional exercise(s) are planned for execution in the fall of 2020.

SenseMakers and the UASI Management Team will provide status reports on the Regional Training and Exercise Program at each Approval Authority meeting through 2020.


## FY20 Regional Training & Exercise Timeline

## **Background:**

The Northern California Regional Intelligence Center is the State designated and federally recognized fusion center for the region. As a multi-jurisdictionally staffed center with many subunits and disciplines, the fusion center is dedicated to the mission of information sharing and providing analytical support to both public safety and private sector critical infrastructure partners within the UASI Area and the Northern Federal District of California. The following information is being provided to give an overview of the fusion center's activities from January 1 to December 31, 2019.



#### **Information Technology—Cyber**

## **Personnel Assigned:** Four (4)


<u>Duties:</u> Cyber team members provide cyber support to local agencies to increase cyber awareness and assistance in the event of a cyber event. NCRIC Cyber Team members currently sit on eight (8) Cyberrelated Boards and Committees.

<u>Activities:</u> The Cyber Team saw an increase in cyber reporting, support, and regional presentations between 2018 and 2019. The team also participated both nationally and internationally to provide and disseminate information on Ransomware and Election Threats.



#### **Digital Forensic Evidence Laboratory**

The NCRIC continues to support the Digital Forensic Evidence Lab (DFEL), which reviews data stored on computers and other portable electronic devices. This work assists in efforts to arrest and convict those engaging in criminal acts.




## Risk Management Unit (RMU)

The RMU is the NCRIC lead for Vulnerability Assessments, Threat Assessments, Special/Large scale Event Support, and the National Special Events Data Call. The NCRIC provides support for events based on the potential risk of criminal activity and provides real-time information sharing and analytical support.

## Personnel Assigned: Three (3)

<u>Duties:</u> Conduct Special Event Threat Assessments (SETA) and Vulnerability Assessments (VAs) along with providing on-site analytical support at Federal SEAR-level special events. Represents the NCRIC as a member of the NFCA Open Source Intelligence Committee and member of the STAS Infrastructure Protection Working Group sub-committee for School Safety VAs.

<u>Activities:</u> The team developed a vulnerability assessment guide for non-profit organizations to quickly assess vulnerabilities at their facilities, developed an approved POST certification for School Safety Vas. and made a presentation at both the 2019 National Homeland Security Conference in Phoenix, Arizona and the 2019 National Fusion Center Association Training event in Alexandria, Virginia.




#### **Private Sector Outreach**




## Analytical Support (NCRIC-AMT, VAT, Priority Crimes, CSU)

## Personnel Assigned: Nineteen (19)

<u>Duties:</u> Various- Analyze transnational and domestic terrorist organizational trends; provide analytical support for requests for information; analyze Suspicious Activity Reports (SARs), including Threat to Life (TTL) and National Threat Operations Center (NTOC) tips and leads; analyze regional criminal activity; coordinate intelligence sharing, provide investigative support, and manage the Gun-Related Intelligence Program (GRIP) in Santa Clara County.

<u>Activities:</u> In 2019, the quantity of Suspicious Activity Reports (SARs) analyzed for deconfliction and determination of a criminal and/or a terrorist nexus increased by 30%. Of the 1217 SARs processed, 38 were FBI NTOC SARs. Case support requests from local law enforcement agencies increased by 262%, due in part to 90 cases opened by the Gun-Related Intelligence Program. The product output for Situational Awareness Products and Partner Update Briefs remained steady. There was a 43% decrease in Information Requests and a 32% decrease in Intel Packet Requests.



#### **Training For Calendar Year 2019**

In 2019, the fusion center conducted 57 training classes. These classes related to homeland security, narcotics enforcement, law enforcement officer safety and investigative techniques. Approximately 2,250 students from allied agencies and organizations attended, an increase in 850 students over last year.

#### **Pilot Projects**

The NCRIC/NCHIDTA participated in and/or chaired several national and local pilot projects in 2019, including:


## FBI National Threat Operations Center (NTOC) Pilot

In response to the 2018 Stoneman Douglas High School shooting in Parkland, Florida, the FBI restructured the Public Access Line (PAL), a national public tip line, as the National Threat Operations Center (NTOC). Citizens can submit tips and leads to NTOC by calling 1-800-CALLFBI, contacting the local FBI field office or submitting an online tip via <a href="https://www.fbi.gov/tips">https://www.fbi.gov/tips</a>. The FBI has been handling these tips and leads by routing them to the appropriate FBI Field Offices, although in many cases there has been no federal nexus. On 7/22/2019, the NCRIC began participating in a 60-day pilot project in which the tips and leads received by NTOC were sent to the NCRIC via eGuardian when NTOC analysts assessed that the tip or lead fell within the NCRIC area of responsibility. The NTOC pilot program was successful and has been instituted as standard operating procedure.

#### **Social Media Partnerships**

The NCRIC continues to partner with various Social Media companies (Google, Facebook, Twitter, etc.) to provide information to public safety agencies when a Threat-to-Life is seen on social media. Potential online threats frequently have not been reported to authorities through existing platforms. This NCRIC-led effort is working to improve credible threat identification and coordination in life threatening situations.

Since late 2018, the social media threat to life reporting has successfully contributed to life-saving and law enforcement efforts in dozens of cases.



## Risk Management 2020 Program Highlights

- Jurisdictions will conduct their annual asset review to fill information gaps and use new templates in Cal COP to add Special Events.
- The NCRIC will update the Hospital Sub-sector in Cal COP.

#### THIRA / SPR 2020 Highlights

The FEMA requirement for 2020 is focused on the capability assessment, known as the Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR), portion of the process. An update to the Threat & Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) will not be required until 2022.

## The UASI Management Team will:

- Hold a workshop in May to conduct the capability assessment portion of the THIRA / SPR for the Core Capabilities in the Prevention and Protection Mission Areas.
- Gather input from the UASI Regional Workgroups in July and August.
- Present the completed THIRA and SPR at the November Approval Authority in preparation for submission to DHS/FEMA by December 31<sup>st</sup>.

## Background:

Approval Authority Bylaws specify that the Approval Authority must use a risk and capability-based methodology to apply for and allocate grant funds. This is consistent with guidance from DHS that states that all levels of government must establish a foundation to justify and guide preparedness activities and investments. In addition, DHS requires all grantees to produce a Threat Hazard Identifications and Risk Assessment (THIRA) and a Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR).

## Bay Area UASI Risk Management Program January 2020

Each year the Bay Area UASI Risk Management Program includes data input, validation, assessments, and reporting to support decision-making and guide grant spending. A risk and capability-based methodology to allocate UASI funds is required by the Department of Homeland Security and is mandated in the Bay Area UASI Approval Authority Bylaws.

This year, there are three steps to our risk management process:

## 1. Risk Management Kick-Off Meeting

WHO: All Bay Area UASI regional and subject matter experts involved in risk management

WHAT: The Bay Area UASI Management Team provides an overview of the risk management process for the grant year, the annual approach to the Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) and Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR); the California Common Operating Picture (Cal COP) for Threat Awareness; as well as Protected Critical Infrastructure Information (PCII) certification requirements.

WHEN: January 30, 2020, 10:00 am – 11:00 am

WHERE: WebEx with the option to attend in person at the Bay Area UASI Office, 711 Van Ness Ave, Ste. 420, San Francisco, CA 94102

## 2. Asset Updates and Special Event Data Collection

WHO: OA and NCIRC subject matter experts who are Cal COP trained and PCII certified.

WHAT: Subject matter experts enter data on special events and review and update asset data based, as needed, in Cal COP. The NCRIC reviews and validates the information.

WHEN: January 31, 2020 – April 30, 2020

WHERE: In Cal COP

Haystax will offer an in-person, general user training for Cal COP on February 26<sup>th</sup>.

#### 3. SPR Workshop

WHO: Regional subject matter experts for the Prevention and Protection Core Capability Mission Areas.

WHAT: Forum to collect input on the capability assessment portion of the THIRA / SPR to meet the 2020 FEMA requirements. The final document will be presented to the Approval Authority in November 2020.
